THE BIG IDEAS & KNOWLEDGE Overview of topics or key questions	Social Justice unit Examine and explore a range of different extracts all linked to different concepts related to social justice. Each week students will study different types of text as well as being given the opportunity to develop their own writing skills, adapting their style and tone to suit different forms.	Detective Fiction To introduce the detective genre through a range of older and modern texts; to develop reading strategies and to appreciate the writer's craft.	Writing detective fiction To respond creatively to what has been studied and to study different styles of writing.	Poetry This scheme is designed to introduce students to the theme of conflict in its various forms across a range of poems. Students will develop personal responses to the poems, by reading critically and understanding how words and poetic techniques convey meaning.	'Merchant of Venice' - Shakespeare study To explore a Shakespeare text. Reflect on key themes of prejudice and discrimination. Students will trace characters and the plot as well as explore contextual factors including life in Elizabethan England.	Gothic Literature This scheme is designed to develop active reading skills and strategies through the study of extracts and poetry based on the Gothic Genre. It will encourage students to explore the links between texts and contexts, which will be explored further through Year 9 study.
