This course aims to give students a really good grounding in the beliefs and practices of a chosen religion, but also reflect contemporary concerns and the 'big issues' in the faiths today. The opportunity for students to apply their knowledge and skills to contemporary issues creates an up-to-date and thoroughly relevant course.
