Holocaust Chapel



This year is the 78th Anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz. 78 year ago Russian troops, journeyed across Europe, fighting as they went from the Russian homeland to their ultimate goal of Berlin, where they finally came across the huge complex that were the Auschwitz camps, including Auschwitz main camp, a converted Polish army barracks and the purpose built death camp of Birkenau, built three miles away and known today as the biggest killing ground of History. The journey that those troops had taken crossed battlefields and sieges, death and destruction, but despite the horrors that they had witnessed on that long terrible journey, they were still utterly shocked by what they encountered. The primitive camp, the emaciated bodies that littered the area, the ruins of Gas Chambers and Crematoria, remnants of factory methods installed to kill millions, the piles of clothes, shoes, food, money and belongings, stolen from those who were murdered in this horrifying culmination of Hitler's war against the Jews.

On Sunday 27th January we held a Chapel service to commemorate the Holocaust and the deaths of over six million Jews. I talked in the sermon about the remarkable journey through the war years of a survivor, Kitty Hart Moxon, who through luck, but also thanks to an iron will and a dedication to life, managed to survive the deprivation of the Lublin ghetto, Auschwitz for two years, slave labour and an enforced death march. Kitty's story is a remarkable story of survival and all those in the congregation were very moved by it. The pupils listened intently and learnt as to why it is so important that all of us never forget to remember. The junior and senior choirs sang two hauntingly beautiful pieces which very much reflected the mood of the service. Though kitty was unable to come due to ill health, we were honored that her son and daughter in law were able to attend the event and light our candle of remembrance on her behalf.

Kitty's journey to, through and from Auschwitz is a remarkable one and it reminds us of both the horrors of the holocaust and also of an incredible spirit and will to survive against all the odds that Kitty demonstrated every day, So may did not make the journey to liberation. Many died of starvation, of work, of disease or in the gas chambers. A journey of annihilation - for this is where so many journey's ended and if Kitty's journey teaches us anything it is this; her journey, that journey, their journey must never happen again.

Our father Alec Bourhill always had fond memories of his time at St George's, and still drank coffee from a mug with the school logo.

Helping with the harvest during evacuation of some of the pupils to Devon in WW2 gave Alec a first taste of agriculture. With his wife Pearl he built up a herd of Jersey cows, of which they were very proud. They ran the dairy farm in Surrey until retirement in their early 60's, when they were able to fulfil their desire to travel. Alec was able to remain living on the farm until he passed away at the age of 95 years, leaving a daughter, son and three grandchildren.

Alec very generously left the school £1000 in his will which the school will use for the benefit of the current students.

I have a slightly different version of the disappearing Venus story.

When we discovered that Venus had disappeared, we were very upset and decided to conduct a funeral for her. We got a bench, covered it with a black cloth and some of the boys hoisted it on their shoulders. Then we went in procession behind the 'coffin' round Harpenden singing 'Let all mortal flesh keep silence'.

The following morning several members of the public rang the school to ask who had died! Penelope nee Bray 1943 - 1957.

I should have added that it was rumoured that the headmaster, Mr Gedge, sold Venus to the garden section of Heale's department store in London, not because he thought she was immodest but because the school was short of money!

Dear Editor, Thank you for the excellent most recent edition of the St George's Newsletter. I was most interested to read the contribution of OG Hazel Stevens (whom I remember well, having played in the school tennis team with her). Hazel mentions a 'friend who went out for a walk and came back with a goat'. I was one of those friends! It must have been 1956 when three of us, Jocelyn Ross, Susan Gairdner and I got permission from the then headmaster, Peter Gedge, to keep a goat. I don't think he ever imagined we would find one but one Sunday afternoon we set off on our bikes and cycled to the goat lands of Kimpton. After drawing a few blanks we lighted on the Blue Cross Dogs' Home where, astonishingly, they had a spare goat. We brought her home, housed her in a rickety shed donated by another OG, a day girl called Jill Fulton and called her Deborah. She was supposed to be the school mascot and we paraded her along the 'cinder path' when the boys had a rugby match. Unfortunately she was far more interested in getting out and eating the lush grass of the playing field than in rugby and we were constantly interrupting chemistry lessons to ask the chemistry teacher, Mr Lindsay, to let his class out so that they could catch her! I lost touch with Deborah in later life but I know she had a kid and led a happy retirement! I often think about our goat-owning days and what a remarkable tribute it was to the openminded and generous spirit of St George's and Mr Gedge that we were allowed to keep her! Do you remember this statue? Can you solve the mystery.....

We have a nice mystery on our hands!

A lady at a local church on Christmas day spoke to a member of staff and said that one of her relatives was in possession of the statue pictured below. He was an Old Georgian and in approximately 1958 he and two other boys were 'expelled / asked not to come back to the school'. Their response was to steal the statue below! The lady thinks it was either in the Chapel or around the library area.

The three of them have passed the statue between themselves for the last 64 years (it is easy to transport!) . However, two of the boys have now passed away leaving the last boy / old man who is now keen to have the statue returned! When questioned by his family how he came to be in possession of the statue revealed where it had come from. He wants to stay anonymous!

Jennifer Tanton 1961 –1969

"I spent many happy hours in the school chapel practicing for concerts, carol services and Sunday services. I was the lead alto in the choir and Roy Terry was a very hard task master!! Spending time in the chapel last Thursday, brought back so many happy memories and it hasn't changed a bit (apart from the memorial window which is beautiful) and the atmosphere is so peaceful."



Jill Adams 1959 - 1969 "Wonderful years for me. Still keeping in touch with classmates"

Anne ne Kenyon 1961 - 1969 *"Memories—bunking off Chapel, boring lessons except Biology and French! Not the best school then for academic standards but overall happy memories of hanging out with friends"*

Louisa Stobbs 1961—1967 "*Great fun, wonderful broad education, not very academic but family life in the boarding house. Very happy times*"

"Memories of picking mulberry leaves off the tree by the old art rooms for silk worms we kept at home. Finding a way to miss daily chapel by hiding in the cloak room despite the fact I left St George's to do a degree in Theology. "

"Mainly happy memories, school was a great social experience, we didn't do too well academically! I particularly remember HST (Mr Taylor—English) and Miss Pam Weatherley. Very influential, both of them. Long summer evenings with Mirahda Basner playing Joan Baez, Bob Dylan etc. on the chapel steps. Quite a few extraordinary outings, Harry Caulo (Geog) took us to St Albans to see "The war Game" which had been banned by the BBC! And we had a trip to see Bob Dylan at the Albert Hall, all very radical for its time."

Cynthia Musgrove 1963–1968

"Watching the Sunday service from the chapel roof (gallery) going down town to get fish and chips and coming back soaked at meal time. Trying to get drunk with cider drinking through a straw in the bedroom, outing carbon paper in our shoes thinking it will make us faint! Loving Sunday breakfast, loving lacrosse, loving playing rugby against the boys, me in goal with a dustbin lid. Playing in a church with sombreros on our head, 3 of us and a guitar. Going to see BoB Dylan, the oxford and Cambridge races and sitting on lots of coins that we used to go on a fun fair nearby. We were a group in the tennis team and nearly missed the bus back to school"
