GCSE Food Preparation and Nutrition

St George's has been lucky enough to be one of 250 schools to receive some of the 2,000 KG of ropegrown mussels being donated by Offshore Shell, packed by River Teign Shellfish and delivered by DFDS.

Did you know that most children don't eat enough fish? Not here! Year 10 have been cooking Thai style mussels & conducting sensory analysis. Students showed off new skills in preparing and cooking the mussels in a Thai sauce. For many students it was their first experience of preparing and tasting mussels. This is not something we would not normally do and feedback from students has been incredibly positive and we hope, helped to diversify their palate! Many thanks go to Offshore Shell, River Teign Shellfish, DFDS and the Food Teachers Centre for this superb opportunity.

To follow on from mussels, we've secured a delivery of individually quick-frozen hake donated by Fastnet, as part of the Fish Heroes project giving students the opportunity to prepare and cook with fish. A big thank you to our local chippy Godfrey's Harpenden who helped coordinate the delivery.

From the School Archives

St George's School Music Society Choir

This school society, known affectionately as MUSSOC, is one of the oldest existing societies in St George's. In 1912 the choir gave its first public performance, singing Handel's Judas Maccabeus in the school Chapel.

Originally the choir was known as the 'Oratorio Choir' and by 1917 'The Musical and Literary Society'. Soon after it was renamed the 'Musical Society' before the current name was taken in the 1990's. The choice of repertoire is typical of a Choral Society and there is an annual performance of a larger scale work. Recent examples include; Magnificat by Vivaldi, Requiems by Rutter and Chilcott, Samson by Handel or you may recall these performances from the 1960's; St Nicholas by Britten, Faure's Requiem or from the 1970's; Elgar's Music Makers, The St John Passion by Bach, or from the 1980's Brahm's Requiem and Handel's Messiah.

From the very start the choir has been open to pupils, staff (including several Headmasters such as Mr Gedge and Mr McGovern,) Georgians, parents of Georgians and friends of the school. The choir has always adopted an 'open door' policy, welcoming anyone who likes to sing, regardless of ability-that's right, there are NO auditions!

MUSSOC meets at school in the Old Library on a Tuesday evening during term time from 7:45-9:00pm. Having sung at the Georgian Carol service in December we are now preparing for a performance in June of Haydn's Nelson Mass and Vivaldi's Gloria.

West End debut with Stranger Things

Old Georgian Christopher Pearce, performing under the name Buckley, makes his West End debut this year in Netflix and Sonia Friedman's critically acclaimed production of 'Stranger Things: 'The First Shadow'

Arriving at St George's in 2007, Chris continuously threw himself into all aspects of performing within the school, playing a variety of roles across plays and Inter-house competitions.

He was made Drama Captain of Watts House in his final year.



Training at the Royal Birmingham Conservatoire in Acting in 2013-2016, he competed for and gained exciting opportunities to perform in the BBC Carleton Hobbs radio competition, as well as at the Globe in their Sam Wanamaker Festival.

Since graduating, Chris has performed on stages across the country and internationally.

From Budapest to Ipswich, Hamburg to

Frinton-Upon-Sea, he has played a variety of roles including cheeky school kids, Greek heroes, befuddled policemen and tortured invalids.

In July 2023, Chris taped for a role in Netflix's inaugural play "Stranger Things: The First Shadow". After an extensive audition process, he was blown away to be offered the role of Bob Newby. The play opened in December at the West End's Phoenix Theatre to glowing reviews. Everyday he still pinches himself to make sure he's

Obituaries:

Jai Nath Misra— Know as Mick was a teacher at St George's in the seventies and eighties. Mick sadly passed away in September last year and his daughter Sheila has shared the obituary that she wrote for him.

My father, Jai Nath Misra – known to everyone as Mick – who has died aged 87, was a mechanical engineer turned maths teacher who taught in schools in <u>Hertfordshire</u> for more than a quarter of a century.

Born in Jaipur in <u>India</u>, he was the fifth living child of Susheela Chaturvedi and Kailesh Misra, and grew up in Bulandshahar in Uttar Pradesh. His father left the family when he was two years old and he grew up with his mother in an extended household consisting of his siblings and a number of cousins, uncles and aunts.

Susheela sold her wedding jewellery to enable him to come to England at the age of 21; he took the boat from Bombay (now Mumbai) and arrived at Victoria coach station in London in 1957 with a small suitcase and broken English.

Mick's degree in mathematics from Agra University was not recognised in England, but before he could enrol at the <u>University of London</u> he needed to be a taxpayer for four years. He therefore took up work hauling milk churns at a dairy, as a postman and cutting sheet metal in various factories, before he was able to sign up for his maths degree.



Jai Nath Misra, in left foreground, "photobombing" Jawaharlal Nehru in 1948. He was 12 at the time and was determined to be photographed with the prime minister of newly-independent India. He borrowed a cart to travel to Delhi with a cousin, having borrowed a camera from his uncle. In 1965, at a tea dance at Chelsea town hall, he met Mary Peggie, a civil servant from Rosyth in Fife. They married in 1967 and moved to St Albans in Hertfordshire.

After his degree Mick worked as an engineer in a factory in Dunstable in Bedfordshire, helping to design and build car parts – in particular carburetors – until he was made redundant in the early 1970s. He then did teacher training at Garnett College, London, in 1973, and subsequently had a 25-year career as a maths teacher at St George's school in Harpenden, St Columba's college in St Albans and what is now Oaklands college, also in St Albans.

In 2001, newly retired, Mick and Mary moved to the village of Spexhall in Suffolk, where they spent eight happy years enjoying rural life.

In 2010 they moved to Belsize Park in north London, where Mick became a volunteer for Age UK and joined a group of UK-based Indians keen to support a new political party in India – the <u>Aam Aadmi party</u> – whose aims were to sweep away corruption and support ordinary working Indians. Mick went to India for three months and campaigned for the party in Delhi.

After Mary died in 2014, and in between time spent with his grandchildren, Mick threw himself into travel, including to Israel and Myanmar. In 2018 he flew to Chicago and drove around Lake Michigan, and in 2019 he took part in the huge Prayag Kumbh Mela religious gathering in Triveni Sangam, Uttar Pradesh. In 2020, aged 84, he went kayaking in the mangroves of the Andaman Islands and later that year travelled to Bhutan.

He loved turning up somewhere new, having a beer and striking up a conversation with whoever happened to walk into the room. He was especially close to my husband, Graham, who was more like a son than a son-in-law.

Mick is survived by me and his three grandchildren, Rufus, Jemima and Gilbert.
