




student led worship bringing a meaningful religious dimension

St George's is a multidenominational Christian foundation with a full time Christian school chaplain. Reverend Cecil Grant, the School's founder, wanted a school for children of all Christian denominations: therefore the student body represents a wide range of Christian beliefs and practices and the Chapel represents the beating heart of the School. The school holds an annual confirmation service and it is not at all unusual for staff members and ex students to marry in our chapel, which has also hosted christenings. It is a special space.

All students attend one chapel service as part of their weekly routine, and students in Years 7 to 11 attend Sunday chapels on three occasions every term. The services offer a range of worship styles to cater for students of all backgrounds, ranging from Catholic masses to informal evening worship. Parents are most welcome to attend Sunday services with their children. Many families choose to do this. We want to challenge our students to think about their beliefs and where worship sits within them. We are delighted that even junior students often feel they have something to say in leading worship, and that their peers are just as keen to listen.





sometimes referred to

as a School within a School

To enhance its family atmosphere, the School is divided into four Day Houses. Students develop multiple loyalties over their time with us but loyalty to their House probably trumps all else. Sometimes referred to as a 'School within a School' the Houses are the backbone of our school and are woven into its DNA. This helps us to know each child better and to increase the family feeling within the School. We expect senior leaders to know all students; Heads of House to know them well; and every student to feel understood and valued as an individual. This includes the House looking after their learning needs and achievement, as well as being the first point of contact for

emotional and mental health and social and medical needs. Tutor groups are organised into Lower School (Year 7 and 8), Middle School (Years 9,10 and 11) and Upper School (Years 12 and 13). Thus a child will stay within one House and might have only three tutors in seven years, and children can integrate well with older and younger students. Each House has a group of prefects and these senior pupils play a major part in the organisation of the many Inter-House activities and competitions that form the Chapman Cup. They also play an important part in settling-in new pupils. Our pupils are our greatest asset and we do our best to look after them.

lessons that are

lively and enjoyable

St George's has no entrance examination. Our students are of all abilities, but their motivation and attitude allied to support from the School leads to exceptional outcomes. We genuinely want our students to learn, understand, feel confident, and excel, not collect pointless extra qualifications. While we offer options like triple GCSE Sciences and A-level Further Maths for those who specialise, our offer is also wide-ranging and diverse. At A-Level, twenty plus subjects are offered in our Sixth Form including a small number of Level 3 BTECs which can be studied through our local consortium.

Those who choose to can take the combination of GCSE subjects

leading to the "English Baccalaureate"; those Sixth Formers who wish to can take the Extended Project Qualification, in topics as diverse as transonic aerodynamics, bipolar disorder, and use of solar power in sub-Saharan Africa. The driver of our curriculum is what is in the interests of the child, not what makes the School's results look good.

Most students move onto further study after Year 13. While many study traditional degrees such as Medicine, History, Law, or Engineering, other courses indicate the way students have found their niche in their time with us: Computer Science and Cyber Security, Prosthetics and Orthotics, Yacht Design and Production, and Midwifery are examples.





the challenge of both leadership and demanding study

Our Sixth Form students are treated as young adults and leaders. It is axiomatic that if required, our senior prefects are capable of running the School. Our own students have learned through the school a doctrine of selfless leadership, and are respected by staff and other students alike for their attitude, presence and approach to the responsibilities they accept. We find new joiners to our Sixth Form rapidly fit into the same mould, bringing a wealth of their own experiences and making a great Sixth Form community. This is a place for those who want to contribute, not those who want to consume education as a commodity.

Academically, Sixth Form students have a great deal of freedom and are expected to

work independently, read widely to prepare for lessons and manage their time effectively to deliver their work to stringent deadlines. Facilities for study are excellent. A strict dress code adds to the aim of providing them with greater awareness that they are on the cusp of entering the adult world. This prepares them for life beyond school, making them able to adapt to a work, training or a Higher Educational environment effectively.

St George's Sixth Form combines strict discipline, clear expectations and high standards. Students who join our Sixth Form know this which ensures they have the correct focus for learning, contributing to our environment and utilising the support needed to thrive in the Sixth Form.

family orientated community



physical activities which allow students to


build belonging and resilience

St George's is a great place to be a sports player. Our focus is to teach and develop decision-making, problem solving, resilience, determination, communication, creativity and awareness, not just sports skill. We have provided a sporting springboard for international players in rugby and lacrosse and for county players in netball and athletics. If keen and able, we nurture excellence. Rugby and lacrosse players have toured South Africa, the USA, and Canada in recent seasons.

But St George's is also a great place if keen and not so able...or even not keen at all.

Because of our approach the great majority of Lower School students choose to attend practice and try out to play versus other schools; and our most senior coach is as likely to look after the C team as the A team. On a Saturday morning last October 350 children were out playing competitively for the School. This our "normal".

Not into rugby and lacrosse? Join St George's and you will get the bug. And if you don't we have basketball, rounders, cricket, tennis, athletics, badminton. If you fence we have classes. If you run long distance we can coach you.

St George's has something for everyone. There are few other state schools which can boast a ski team, sailing team, and riding team, all of which compete both amongst themselves and against other schools. 



develop greater cultural experience



St Georges has offered the Bronze and Gold Duke of Edinburgh Awards since 2011. Our +95% success rate for pupils completing their Bronze Award is quite an achievement. In the last 5 years over 600 students have participated making St George's the biggest school in the South East for the Bronze Award. Our records don't end with the students; 18 St George's teaching staff are now D of E leaders and we

have around 30 students attempting their Gold Award each year. Last year alone the Bronze cohort completed the equivalent to over 100 days worth of volunteering in the local area. Bronze expeditions take place in the Chiltern Hills. Gold expeditions are normally in the Lake District Kentmere Valley if walking however every year we have teams that have opted to sail or canoe too!





Progressing through the school, I have specifically noticed the impact of student responsibility in nurturing pupils into becoming young adults; allowing us to gain confidence in leadership and organisation is what sets St George's aside.
